

MEDICAL DIRECTIVE Emergency Contraceptive Pill (ECP) for Pregnancy Drug Prophylaxis

Authorizing physician(s)

Physician of the Domestic Violence/Sexual Assault Care Centre (DV/SACC) Emergency Department Physicians (LH Oshawa Only)

Authorized to who

Registered Nurses working at the DV/SACC who have been certified as a Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE). Nurses that hold the knowledge, skill and judgment that work within the DV/SACC Program.

Patient Description / Population

To be offered to any female client within menstruating age, presenting within 120 hours of a suspected or known sexual assault regardless of condom use.

Medical Directive Description/Physician's Order

Levonorgestrel 0.75 mg, 2 tablets once, orally

Specific conditions/circumstances that must be met before the Directive can be implemented

- Client must be registered to DV/SACC
- DV/SACC standard sexual assault and health history be completed by the RN in consultation with the client
- Explain the use of ECP to the client, including action
- Last menstrual period was greater than 1 month ago
- Client is not currently pregnant
- Document assessment findings
- Advise client that levonorgestrel has a low incidence of side effects that may include: gastrointestinal disturbance, dizziness, headache, breast tenderness and fatigue
- Advise client to have pregnancy test if period is more than 2 weeks late in starting. Advise client that spotting is not considered a period
- Advise client that there is considerable reduction in effectiveness of levonorgestrel with increased delay between the sexual assault and initiation of treatment

Time lapse after	Effectiveness of
unprotected intercourse	Plan B
< 24 Hours	95%
24-48 Hours	85%
49-72 Hours	58%
72-120 Hours	<58%

Contraindications to the implementation of the Directive

- Client is allergic to levonorgestrel
- Ongoing undiagnosed abnormal vaginal bleeding of the client pre-sexual assault
- Known or suspected pregnancy

Identify relevant Delegated Control Act or Added Skill associated with this Directive None

Documentation requirements

- Document medication administration as per Lakeridge Health Policy
- Document on client treatment and follow up form

Review/Evaluation Process (how often/by who)

Review to be done on a biannual basis. Review to be conducted by the DV/SACC Medical Director and the DV/SACC RN
