Progress Continues on Better, Faster and Safer Campaign



In early 2015, Lakeridge Health Foundation was tasked with raising \$5 million to fund the redevelopment of Lakeridge Health's interventional radiology unit. This unique hospital program houses 16-year-old equipment and an outdated space. Yet despite its shortcomings, our IR department continues to provide innovative and specialized care to patients throughout the hospital.

What is IR?

Interventional radiology (IR) is a sub-specialty that focuses on minimally invasive procedures guided by imaging. Lakeridge Health's team of IR experts use the smallest tools in our hospital to do incredible things through pinholes in the skin - and all within minutes. Patients and programs from all over the hospital benefit from IR procedures including dialysis, cancer, palliative care and women's health.

Our donor community is passionate and supportive of this project and the campaign continues to be successful. With over 80% of our goal reached, we are thrilled to see the redevelopment catch up to our momentum.

Earlier this year, a new Director of Diagnostic Imaging joined the team and has begun working closely with staff to ensure the project meets the needs of our team and patients.

"I'm coming into this project at both an exciting and critical time for Interventional Radiology," says new Director, Ron Burke. "The entire team is buzzing with enthusiasm and part of my role is to work with our capital planning team and various stakeholders across the organization to make sure all of those expectations are met."

"The new IR suites represent a remarkable investment opportunity to advance our program with respect to high quality, safe, efficient, and effective patient care. We will be able to expand appropriate and equitable access to a wide variety of existent and additional procedures, invest into education and development of all associated staff, while enhancing patient and team satisfaction."

This fall, construction will commence on

the department's new home. On top of acquiring two new C-arm units for the department, the new area will be designed in alignment with surgical suites, be 2-3 times larger, have increased storage in the rooms and showcase a new, improved layout that works for the staff, not against them.

"I was surprised to see the space we're currently working in - I'm told it's the smallest of its kind in Canada. I really admire the amazing work of the entire team - our Radiologists, Nurses, and Technologists and what they've accomplished in this area. The new department space will be incredible for the whole team - we'll have room to maneuver, better work flow, increased staffing, advanced instrumentation with improved efficiency and image quality, as well as the ability to take on almost twice as many patients - truly a remarkable advancement!"

Part of the redevelopment will include the transformation of a formerly unused space into a family waiting room for loved ones. Located right next to entrance of the suites, this waiting space will allow family members to be in closer proximity during procedures and allow for a quiet, separate space from

our busy diagnostic imaging waiting room.

What's more, the new family waiting room will feature a unique mini donor wall thanking our campaign supporters who have donated \$10,000 or more to the redevelopment project.



Foundation Receives Largest Gift to Interventional Radiology Campaign



When you enter the hospital, your first interaction is likely with a volunteer. They are the most recognizable individuals at our site, with their blue smocks and a wealth of knowledge. These individuals take pride in helping each and every one of you navigate your experience in our hospital – and never ask for anything in return.

The Auxiliary of Lakeridge Health Oshawa is made up of over 300 volunteers and assisted by over 150 student volunteers. They're in the gift shop, Auxiliary Café, the Cancer Centre and throughout the hospital's many other departments.

What you might not know is that the Auxiliary is also one of the largest supporters of the hospital having donated over \$12 million over the years to help with important needs for the Oshawa site.

"Like the Foundation, our goal is to support the Hospital and we do that through our service as volunteers and the donating of our revenues," says Helen Gulka, President of The Auxiliary of Lakeridge Health Oshawa. "One of our most significant gifts was a \$2 million donation when the Cancer Centre was being built and we've



followed up with other large gifts since then."

Those gifts have also been significant – an MRI machine, \$1 million to the redevelopment of our Hospital's inpatient pharmacy, a unique project that will see the relocation and improvement of the pharmacy space and \$260,000 to upgrade and replace operating tables in our surgical suites.

More recently, at the beginning of 2017, the Auxiliary voted on another large gift to a hospital project – \$1 million to the Foundation's interventional radiology campaign.

"Our volunteers come from all walks of life" says Helen, "and the interventional radiology was something that resonated with a lot of us. Sure it was a bit confusing at first, as is everything medical, but what we loved the most was that it will benefit

patients all over our hospital."

The Foundation is thrilled to see the largest gift to the interventional radiology campaign to date come from such an important group in the hospital, "Our volunteers are the longest standing supporters of the hospital," says Yves Gadler, Chief Executive Officer, Lakeridge Health Foundation. "From the very beginning they have provided the necessary funding to keep this community at the forefront of health care. I speak on behalf of the Foundation, Board of Directors and Hospital staff when I say thank you to each and every volunteer for the time and energy that went in to raising this money. Thank you for helping us to provide the very best health care, close to home."

This year marks the 110th Anniversary of

the Auxiliary of Lakeridge Health Oshawa. In 1907, Adelaide McLaughlin formed the Ladies Auxiliary to help raise funds to build a much needed hospital in her community. The Auxiliary raised \$1,000 to purchase the land, and three short years later, the first hospital building was complete.

Today, the hospital has expanded to serve our rapidly growing community and that same drive and dedication lives on with the hundreds of volunteers in our hospital. The next time you see one of the Auxiliary volunteers at the hospital, remember that they provide more than just directions, they help to fund the very equipment that you and your loved ones rely on.

Lifelong Learners Honoured with Establishment of Prestigious Awards



Early last year, Lakeridge Health celebrated an unprecedented gift – a \$2.5 million donation to establish a Research Chair in Palliative Care with Queen’s University. A first for a community hospital in Canada, the generosity of one couple will propel Lakeridge Health to the forefront of care options for patients with complex conditions.

Named after Dr. Gillian Gilchrist, a pioneer in palliative care in our community, the Dr. Gillian Gilchrist Chair in Palliative Care is the result of a lifetime of dedication to professional development for Deborah (Debbie) and Dr. Hak Ming Chiu.

In honour of this transformational gesture, Lakeridge Health Foundation also established an education and research opportunity of its own: *The Hak Ming Chiu Award – Strategic Contribution to Education* and the *Deborah Chiu Award – Research into Practice*. The awards, named to recognize the efforts of the couple and their lifelong commitment to education and

to them to build upon their knowledge and better serve their patients.

For Debbie, that meant achieving her Bachelor Degree in nursing by teleconference while working full-time in the ED. She followed this with earning her Master’s in Nursing and a Post-Master’s Acute Care Nurse Practitioner diploma. While she enjoyed emergency nursing, it was working in the oncology department of the hospital that Debbie felt she found her calling.

“I fell in love. First with oncology, where I became the first full-time nurse in the department, and a little later with Hak Ming.”

patient care, aims to put the spotlight on frontline hospital staff.

These awards will recognize staff for taking the initiative to teach health care professionals, conduct research and/or use current research findings to provide evidence based patient care. It’s expected the awards and their corresponding grants will provide a pipeline for colleagues and management to make changes when it comes to treatments and clinical models.

“Being honoured through these awards means a lot to us,” says Debbie. “We are excited that frontline staff will be recognized for their hard work and drive to advance knowledge and patient care.”

Both Debbie and Hak Ming are retired Lakeridge Health staff who started their careers over 40 years ago – Debbie as a nurse in our Emergency Department (ED) and Hak Ming as one of the first trained Hematologists coming out of the University of Toronto. Throughout their professional life, the Chiu’s took every opportunity provided

Hak Ming came to Oshawa to open a clinical practice after three years of innovative research in hematology at McMaster University. He landed in Oshawa and soon built a busy clinic focused on patients with blood conditions and various cancers. For more than two decades, he took an afternoon from patient care each quarter to teach medical students their hematology rotations in Toronto.

During those times, Hematologists were the first to care for patients with cancer. It wasn’t until 1982 that medical oncology became a recognized sub-specialty in Canada. Even though physicians in his field were automatically recognized as medical oncologists, it was important to Hak Ming to gain his credentials through the same exam as others after him.

“I wanted hospital staff, but more importantly my patients, to know the care they were receiving was equal to any other medical oncologist,” reflects Hak Ming. “I passed the exam and became one of a

few physicians to have three sub-specialties. Even to this day it’s rare.”

For the Chiu’s, their community is at the heart of why they give. “This community gave us our livelihood and our satisfying careers – and continues to be our home. It was this reason that we pondered how we could give back to Durham Region,” says Debbie.

“The Research Chair was always my husband’s idea” explains Debbie. “We grappled with how to find a way for academics to complement a community hospital and how our community could act as an exciting opportunity for research. Palliative care is so fitting – so much of this care occurs at home, or locally in a hospital or hospice. Patients want and need their families and social-spiritual connections close. Palliative Care isn’t restricted to ‘end-of-life’ or to cancer. Other patients, old and young, with chronic illnesses and complex symptoms receive value-added from palliative care too. Our Research Chair holder will decide his or her research focus over the years to come, and build knowledge from year to year. Through his or her work, communities near and far will have access to quality research findings from which to evaluate for their community”.

The search for the best expert to take on the academic chair opportunity and hold the Dr. Gillian Gilchrist Chair in Palliative Care is in progress. In the meantime, the Chiu’s celebrated the inaugural award recipients this past June where two more Lakeridge Health staff will carry on the legacy of putting education and research into practice.

Never Ending Love Story Sparks Husband To Give



“This isn’t my story, it’s Anne’s.”

This one sentence is the single most important part of our time with David Bezzant. Each and every donor has a personal journey of how they came to make their first donation. For David, father of three and newly crowned grandfather, it’s to honour his late wife, Anne.

“She was the CEO of our family. My wife was the glue that held our busy lives together. And she was truly selfless. Even when she was diagnosed with a rare and ‘sneaky’ form of breast cancer in 2013, Anne never once questioned her journey. It was never ‘why me’ but always ‘why not me’.”

When David speaks of his wife, it’s clear how much they loved each other. Their never ending love story began and ended, as David explains, at Lakeridge Health.

“We met at the hospital in 1966 when

I was a nursing orderly and Anne was an x-ray technologist in training. Even our three children, Robert, Lisa and Michael were born at Lakeridge Health.”

Years later, David went on to work as a paramedic in Whitby. After suffering a back injury, he became a dispatcher for the Durham Regional Police Service where he received a number of awards for helping to save the lives of members of our community. It was this medical background that made David even more aware of his wife’s health concerns when they began just a few years ago.

After her diagnosis, Anne underwent surgery to remove her one breast and 19 nodes under her left arm. It was soon discovered her cancer had moved to her lower back and pelvis. Her journey was not

easy, tells David. She experienced every unfortunate symptom during chemotherapy and underwent countless scans to monitor her condition. In May of 2015, Anne was rushed to the hospital where it was discovered her cancer had also spread to her stomach and caused an untreatable blood disorder called Disseminated Intravascular Coagulation (DIC). She remained under the close supervision of her medical team at Lakeridge Health, until

June 5 when David and their family chose to bring her home for her final days.

Anne passed comfortably in her own home holding the hand of her oldest son Robbie on June 7, 2015. “It was Anne’s love for faith and family,” recalls David, “that enabled her to be at peace during this journey. I look back at all the care we received and we are so grateful.”

Last year David began supporting the Hospital with an annual donation of \$1,321 – a combination of his and Anne’s birthdates. “I give because I want to recognize the people who cared for my family. I have a lot of love and respect for the team that was there for my dear wife.”

Making a gift in the name of a loved one can be a meaningful way to honour their legacy and ensure others receive the same compassionate care you’ve experienced. This couldn’t be truer for David. His love story took on another chapter when, at the same hospital he met Anne at 50 years ago, his grandson Cameron was brought into this world under the expert care of Lakeridge Health staff.

Retired Surgeon Inspired to Give Back



Sometimes the most generous acts happen right before our eyes. In fact, one of Lakeridge Health Foundation’s recent gifts came only a few steps from the Hospital’s front door.

You may be familiar with the house on Hospital Court, right next to Alexandra Park. It’s the last remaining of five converted homes on the land and up until the end of 2015, the house had been a bustling urology clinic belonging to Dr. Kris Sachdeva.

Dr. Sachdeva, now retired, used the sale of his clinic to support Lakeridge Health Foundation with an \$800,000 donation to benefit surgical needs at the hospital. The general surgeon and urologist began working at Lakeridge Health in January of 1980 and has cared for patients at all hospital sites across Durham Region. “I’ve had a full career,” reflect Dr. Sachdeva, “I got old and seasoned here. I was the Chief of Urology three times in Oshawa and Chief of General Surgery three times in Whitby. I was also President of the Medical Staff Association and President of the Ontario Medical Association – Durham Branch in the 1990s.”

He also kick started an organ donation project and prostate cancer support group that is still running today. In addition to his medical accolades, Dr. Sachdeva speaks just as highly about the community he’s loved since moving here 37 years ago.

“This whole community is nice. I purchased

our home here, raised my kids here and now they are on their own. Naturally when you find a place you love you don’t move around. So I’ve been here since the beginning.”

Caring for people is a longstanding family tradition for Dr. Sachdeva. “I come from a family of physicians, my father and grandfather. My father in particular never said no to anyone and would travel to other cities in India to help others.”

His medical career began in India, then London, England until his drive to learn more about endo-urology sparked him to jump across the ocean to London, Ontario. When looking to start his practice at a community Hospital, Oshawa was a great fit.

Dr. Sachdeva has made the house on hospital court his professional home since he started at Lakeridge Health. His goal was always to provide patients with a one-stop shop. “Having the hospital so close was ideal, but I also wanted to do as much as I could for my patients under one roof to decrease their waiting and any undue stress.” With this approach, he was able to provide ultrasound and urodynamic services in his clinic and send patients a few steps away for more complicated scans like CT.

The now retired surgeon finally felt the need to slow down in 2015. “Nothing lasts forever. I know I’m getting older, my children are accomplished in their amazing careers and have families that keep them very busy so I thought I should start enjoying life away from the hospital while keeping my hands busy two days a week assisting my colleagues.”

It’s those colleagues and the countless patients that rely on Lakeridge Health surgical services that will truly benefit from his retirement and subsequent major donation. Dr. Sachdeva’s vision for the surgical department is one where the most innovative equipment is paired with areas that are comfortable and accommodating for surgeons.

Looking after your staff and providing them with the best resources is just as important, says Dr. Sachdeva, as focusing on patient care. “If we can give our surgeons and staff the very best equipment and working environment they can better serve their patients. Not only that, we can attract the best talent to our community, expand services and provide more innovative treatment options.”

Wolfpack Tournament Hits A Howl-In-One



Local residents host ninth annual golf tournament for cancer care

Over eight years ago, Wolfpack – a local sports team - was inspired to start a golf tournament that would raise funds for cancer care. Following a close relative's diagnosis, the friends of over 20 years decided that they would use their competitive nature to help support a great cause.

Their first tournament was created with only one month's notice. With the support of family and friends, 72 golfers raised just over \$3,000. Since then, the tournament has grown to have a reputation as a fun, entertaining and competitive event. Now in its ninth year, this local-run tournament has raised over \$180,000 for Lakeridge Health.

Donating the funds of the tournament close to home is very important to the group, "Many people have a story about a family member or friend that has needed the hospital", says one of the organizers Wes Houston, "most of the sponsors for

the tournament are family, friends and local businesses who are more than happy to help support their hospital."

The tournament sells out almost instantly, reaching their maximum capacity of 152 golfers within a few short weeks. "At the end of the day we always take a step back and take pride in what we've accomplished", says Wes, "it's for a great cause and we all win". The Wolfpack group offers some advice for others in the community who are thinking about starting their own event to support the hospital: "You need to start somewhere. It takes time and growth to be successful, just be patient and put the effort in". The incredible growth of this tournament proves just that.
